Family to Family has always been an important holiday tradition at CCB, but this year will be different in how Samaritan House, through its donors like us, will be supporting families and seniors in need.

We will not be adopting individual families as we usually have done. We will be giving in specific ways, and the families will pick up their gifts by driving through at Samaritan House.

Here's how we can help!

1. Purchase a warm jacket or coat for children and teens, any color, any size. Please do not wrap. Drop them off at church in the barrel in the Narthex. Or purchase jackets and have them sent to the church to the attention of Lea Mavroudis, the CCB admin.

2. Make a cash donation by mailing a check made out to CCB to the church to the attention of Lea. Please write Family to Family in the memo line on your check. Or you can donate using your credit card by going to the CCB Square account and typing Family to Family in the box that asks for the address for the tax deductible letter. This money will be used to buy Target and Safeway gift cards for the families.

The deadline for our gifts to be received at the church is Nov. 22. This early date will allow Samaritan House to organize the drive-through pick-ups.



Thank you for all your support this year from the Family to Family team, which includes Andrew Altorfer, Elizabeth Nordt and me. The need has tripled. Please let your family and friends know they can donate jackets and money too.


Maybe it's an old family recipe, or a cultural tradition, or simply food that makes you happy. During the call we'll talk about what we brought and why it's significant to us.

CROP Walk rides (this year) to ease hunger

The parking lot of Congregational Church of Belmont was the starting point for the Oct. 18 Car Parade to raise funds for the 2020 CROP Hunger Walk.

Due to the pandemic, supporters formed a car parade instead of walking together on the usual route in Menlo Park. The parade traveled to the Ecumenical Hunger Program in East Palo Alto where donations of staples were delivered.

CCB members were joined in the parade by reps from First Church Redwood City and Hillsdale Methodist Church.

In CCB's parking lot, cars were decorated with posters and inspiring messages written on car windows, and cash and check donations were collected

The parade of cars began at 1:30 to make its way to EHP to deposit a substantial supply of beans, rice, canned goods and cleaning supplies. Paraders were welcomed by director of the program Nevida Butler and her development associate Ellen Izuka.

Some church members took advantaged of the opportunity to tour the warehouse facility that serves hundreds of needy people in the county every week.

CCB has participated in the hunger walk for many years which is sponsored by Church World Service to raise funds to alleviate hunger around the world. One quarter of what is raised by Peninsula CROP Walk goes to the EHP.




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

What you can expect

In these story-sharing sessions, we will experience the CARE practices:

- Create a space for exploration;
- Ask self-awakening questions;
- Reflect theologically; and
- Enact or experiment.

In these practices, we create together a safe and welcoming place to look within and beyond and, most importantly, we have time to visit and deepen relations among ourselves. (There are four CARE practices but the greatest of these is this space.) And we will be careful to honor the time and the stories you share.

What is CCB FutureCARE 2020?

FutureCARE 2020 is the "futuring journey" CCB has begun as part of my work here as your interim pastor.

Since March, a small group of members and I have been working to create this "journey" toward the future with fresh vision and new leadership. It is the whole community engagement about which you have been hearing and reading. Just to refresh your memory, the FutureCARE FAQ is included below.

The FAQs: WHAT is it?


A social and spiritual exploration of the Future.

• A congregation-wide, learning journey to help CCB make wise, realistic and sustainable decisions about the future of CCB, and to accomplish these outcomes:

• Complete the UCC local church profile equipped with a comprehensive sense of the strengths and challenges faced, as well as a realistic picture of possible future directions as CCB seeks to refresh its mission/ministry in the future.

• Describe clearly the leadership required to serve that future story and begin the search for appropriate candidates.

• Practice communal discernment to follow God's leading in choosing future

direction and ministry opportunities in this community.

• Learn, discuss, explore and move to action in healthy, generative and highly collaborative ways in which the collective good takes priority over the sum of any parts.

• "...the whole congregation journeyed by stages...as the LORD commanded." (Exodus 17:1a)

WHY is CCB doing this?

To explore and clarify who we are and are becoming, what we care most about, and what we/CCB intend to give ourselves and resources to in the future as a congregation of God's people. This approach involves every member who will take part in discerning what mission and ministry God calls this congregation to going forward. When that is clear, we/CCB will know what pastoral leader to seek to serve among us.

ONE BIG ASSUMPTION: Historically, Christians believe congregations form in response to a call by God to live fully, authentically in our unique gifts and experience, joining in God's work for good in the world God so loved, and each of us, too. That is the "future story" we want to know more about.

Q: WHO is responsible?

We all are; everyone who is willing to

participate. FutureCARE uses a "community approach" that grows relationships, spiritual practice, communication and leadership skills as we go along.

We will use a particular kind of story our personal stories and our shared stories as a space to explore while making the shift from what has been to what will be. Stories are excellent containers for the truth of our lives and our deepest intentions; they help us become aware of what we care most about and what we desire give our time, talents, and resources to in the future.

HOW will CCB do this?

A: CCB will embark on a learning journey together to sense and name emerging future possibilities (rather than reacting to or continuing patterns of the past). The social and spiritual "path" (UPath) of discernment we use adapts approaches taken in Forum for Theological Education's VocationCARE, Marshall Ganz' (Harvard) Public Narrative and Otto Scharmer's Theory U (MIT).

WHEN will FutureCARE happen?

We're starting this week and, our journey should be drawing to an end in December or early January. Many of the tasks and practices can be done simultaneously. The energetic participation of everyone in this community is urged and desired.


But, of course, it's not to be. What we are really deep into is Covid, and Chocolate Fest is just one of its victims this year.

Each of the partners will deliver your orders to the church, and we will contact you to arrange for free pickup. You also have the option to have your items shipped for an additional shipping fee.

That's it!

Our wonderful partners will be returning a portion of the amount they receive from this program so future Chocolate Fests (and community organizations like Samaritan House and Second Harvest) benefit as well.
