Pastor Liz offers her vision for CCB's future

My service among you as interim pastor is coming to an end, and what a time it has been! Also, what a blessing and honor. This

time with you has instructed and deepened commitment to my own vocation in service to the church. I have learned so much about you and from you that that we can all raise our voices to give thanks. Or even say, Hallelujah! Thanks be to God!

A year ago, I wrote in these pages, "The quality of our shared experience in completing the interim work will, I believe, ensure the quality of the outcomes." (The Messenger, June 2020) Not to say,

"I told you so," but the quality of our time together at the Congregational Church of

Belmont over the last months has been rich, challenging and wonderful.

Even as we navigated our new relationship and the COVID-19 pandemic, we made

time for cultivating the rich ground of personal stories and relationships, developing the ability to learn and discern together, so as to move into action together as a congregation.

The time between one settled pastor and the next can be especially rich for playing in the soil, digging around to see what's underneath all the activity (or lack of it) that we can see. And I asked you all to "go deep" and all who could have done just that (So sorry

have done just that. (So sorry you can't see my happy dance over here.)
As an interim, among my responsibilities

is to notice, name and nurture the gifts of grace and (especially) leadership that I see in members. I believe that, fundamentally, this is the work of congregations. I hope I have done this, and I believe we have done this together in our walk over the months, making faith-sense of life as it happens — even when everything "normal" falls apart! — between Sacraments.


Now, as I take my leave, here are a few specific thoughts about what I see — Pastor Liz's vision for CCB, if you will:

Living, growing systems require time and Sabbath. Everything that is needed is here.

Council is considering calling bridge pastor for next phase

So what happens now?

Pastor Liz's last Sunday will be Aug. 1, and the Church Council is planning for the months between Pastor Liz and the arrival of our next settled pastor.

The best thinking on Council right now is to bring in a bridge minister who will help us through this final phase of solidifying our vision and path forward, creating a local church profile, and handling pastoral duties while we identify our next pastor.

The Pastoral Search Committee is talking with Rev. Sally Train, who was with us for a few months before Pastor Liz arrived, about returning in the role of "bridge pastor" during that period.

"It's looking promising so far but there are several logistics we need to work out over the next few weeks," Greg Thornhill, Pastoral Search chair, said.

"One of the ideas that Council is mulling is whether we might want to have pulpit supply a couple of Sundays per month to allow our bridge minister time to help us work through our remaining visioning process."

It's possible we may need to invite pulpit supply pastors to fill in until the bridge pastor is in place. With luck, it won't be long. First Sunday

It was a first-time rafting experience for most, including many of the parents. Some extra-exciting adventures were had through the class III rapids with five of our rafters taking an unexpected swim, but no one was injured. (Class II and III are all "swimmable" rapids.) Afterwards, the youth were talking about what river they want to raft next time.

We are getting geared up for Family Camp on July 16-18. We arrive after dinner on Friday and enjoy the evening with a campfire. On Saturday we're excited to have the climbing wall available for our youth for the first time! We'll also have time for talent show and skits, and maybe even a water balloon fight again. Monte Toyon will prepare all our meals on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday. After breakfast Sunday morning, we will enjoy a beautiful outdoor worship service before we leave.

The youth are trying to organize themselves (with a bit of guidance from BCE) to host a benefit concert on our front lawn in to support the Trevor Project, which supports



LGBTQ youth. It is an ambitious undertaking, but we're happy to support them. No date has been set for the concert.

Attendance on Sunday mornings has been low for children under 12, despite our offering child care. We are not sure if this is because of Covid concerns for families with unvaccinated children or other reasons. Lea has been calling our families to find out what

we could do better. From initial feedback we have brought back the old-style Time with Children, with children coming up to the front and ringing the bells. We're still working on camera angles to avoid streaming individuals unwittingly.

Our older youth have requested Sunday School be brought back for them as well, which we will look into.

Special Offering helps buy school backpacks

Remember those envelopes in the pews that had Special Offerings printed on the front? Now that worship has returned to the Sanctuary, the Special Offerings have been reinstated.

Congregants again will have the opportunity to contribute to good causes throughout the year.

The Social Action committee discussed what areas might be considered for Special Offerings. Locally, we decided upon the following:

- Samaritan House/Special Requests
- The Crop Walk
- Puente De La Sur
- Family to Family

In addition to local needs, the Social Action Committee will choose two other outreach programs of the United Church of Christ. These will be determined later.

Our first Special Offering appeal will be the Samaritan House Backpack Drive. Children deserve everything they need to learn and return to school with confidence. Part of this confidence comes from shiny new school supplies. In the past, we've purchased and filled backpacks ourselves, but this year Samaritan House will ask for donations online or by check.

This year's backpack giveaway will take place in early August. Families will have the opportunity to pick up brand-new backpacks filled with school supplies during a designated drive-through time slot. The goal is to distribute more than 2,000 new backpacks with school supplies to students throughout San Mateo County.

The Backpack Drive is direct support for education of our community's children. Access to education is social justice in action!

The deadline for all backpack contribu-

tions will be July 30. Donations can be made in three ways: Special Offering envelopes found in the pews, on-line, or by sending a check to the church office. Be sure and write Samaritan House Backpacks on the memo line.

Help make sandwiches for Open Cathedral on Aug. 29

CCB will provides sack lunches for San Francisco's Open Cathedral ministry to the homeless every fifth Sunday.

So please come early for church at 9:30 a.m. to make PB&J sandwiches and pack the lunches. It takes about an hour to produce 120 lunches, and Valerie McEntee picks them up and takes them to Golden Gate Park where they are distributed.

It's a great opportunity to practice social justice.

"Initially I felt a seriously deep sense of loss at even the thought of Caz leaving UCC, but the transfer is really just like selling a house when everyone else has grown up and moved away and what's left is a truly-toolarge building for just one or two people.

"It's totally right to release Caz to a new family who can fill it and use it. We are only releasing the physical property – not our decades of memories, life affirmations, nature connections, friendships, loves, spiritual awakenings, skills learned, creativity explored, delightfully age-less sense of play, nor anything else that made Camp Caz special to each and all of us.

"People move, die, change – but they are always 'with' us whenever we remember them. The same is true for Camp Caz."
