This is a cause that CCB is eager to support in any way we can, so I have


been coordinating closely with NA's representatives to find a way to make this work smoothly, while also being sensitive to other church events or rentals that may be going on.

### Our Search process: What we know and what we don't

As CCB continues the search process for a new settled pastor, Vice Moderator, Danielle Chamberlin took the time to summarize where we are on that process, what we've already accomplished and what questions may lie ahead. Here is that review.

CCB started to prepare for the transition to a new minister in 2017, knowing that our full-time pastor was preparing to retire in 2019.

In 2019, we called an interim pastor, who unfortunately did not end up coming. During our period of lay-led church leadership, we conducted another visioning exercise at our 2019 Harvest Dinner. We gathered together over a meal to look at what our purpose should be, what draws us to church, and things we should let go of. That report is located here.

We then hired Rev. Elizabeth Mitchell Clement in March 2020, who led us through a visioning process focused on Theory U. A number of lay leaders went through a "storycatcher training" and then we met together with the congregation to hear their

stories and find their meanings. The "red threads" that the storycatchers found are stored here.

We distilled our thoughts into this visual: "A little church on the top of a hill that extends its arms out into its community and spreads love and healing and hope."

At our annual meeting in February 2021, we kicked off the next phase of our visioning exercise. We summarized, from our storycatching, what gives us energy and makes more energy. Then, we asked for people to share their visions with each other, through lent.

These visions were then deconstructed into their parts on sticky notes, and reconstructed into a poster on which the congregation voted for three items: what items they think will sustain our congregation, what is our personal passion, and what we think would bring people in.

Where we still do not have clarity is what the right structure is to sustain that vision. We have a building which is both an asset and takes a tremendous amount of volunteer effort to sustain. We have specific decisions to make about:

- With the limited membership and exhausted church leadership, should we try to grow, or should we look for merger/closure/shared service opportunities with the several other local UCCs which are in a similar situation?
- Or should we take our assets (membership of approximately 60 with 25 in worship on an average Sunday, about \$250k in the bank, and a building that brings in rental income) and invest them in the visions we've outlined?
- Do we sell the building to another congregation which is better suited to support it and rent back?
- Do we spin it off into a separate organization focused on renting the property and generating income while we focus on our church mission?
- Do we invest in growing the church by renovating/updating our building first?
- Do we need to hire paid staff to lead us through that effort?

Church Council is considering hiring a consultant to help us bring clarity to these questions and find our path forward.

Guardian Scholar Program — To assist students who attend San Francisco State and were in foster care for most of their childhoods.




shoes, if only for a moment. There are few activities more worthwhile than this.
