Some people like to make resolutions, but I prefer visualizations. It feels gentler


and relies less on my will power and more on my higher power. In my mind's eye, I visualize what I would like to see happen in the coming year.



# Social Action has been busy during holiday season

The Social Action Committee sponsored three Special Offerings supporting special causes since mid-November.

#### **Family-2-Family**

The appeal for cash donations for Family-2-Family garnered \$1,320. In addition to the cash donations for gift cards, our church donated canned goods and clothing.

Samaritan House provides safety net services such as groceries, medical care and financial assistance to people needing support in our community. Providing basic needs is the first order of business but, on an emotional level, the F2F program gives families the holiday joy to share with their children.

#### **Severe December Storms**

A second Special Offering appeal went out to CCB. So far \$1,142 has been collected and sent to United Church of Christ Disaster Relief Agency. These funds will go to help the people affected by the December tornadoes in the Midwest.


#### **Second Harvest**

November's Special Offering supported the Second Harvest food bank. Although there are more requests for food during the holiday season, food insecurity is an ongoing need in our communities.

#### **Future Special Offerings**

The Guardian Scholar Program at San Francisco State University will assemble care packages for students who have moved out of foster care. It is the hope of the committee that this might be a project that the youth could undertake. Social Action funds will be used to make purchases.

We have been in touch with Home & Hope. Since Covid, H&H is no longer sponsoring families at participating churches. They are planning a walk/run fundraiser in the Spring. They also are asking for food donations for their clients; canned goods can be dropped off at their office in Burlingame.



### **Dead backyard pine removed**

The huge pine tree that has been a fixture of CCB's backyard for at least 50 years — a tree that we had managed to save 20 or so years ago after much expert consultation and prayer — finally succumbed to the ravages of drought, beetles and age. At a cost of about \$5,000, a crew from JC Tree Care climbed, sawed and mulched and, in the course of the day, the tree disappeared. Now there is nothing but mulch inside of the CPNS planter boxes. We'll probably miss the shade of the tree, but we may also be treated to new wonders created by the extra light.

### **Council creates position of building** assistant, tackles audio/visual issues

In an effort to make the church building more secure, the Church Council has created the position of Building Assistant and hired Garrett House for that job.

Garrett will make two circuits of the building every day, morning and evening, to see that doors are locked, lights are out and we have no water issues. If he finds any major problems, he will alert Trustees or call a repairman.

Because Garrett is living in the upstairs apartment, it's convenient for him to take on this task.

The Council also has established an Audio/Visual Advisory Committee to deal with the ongoing microphone and recording issues that continue to plague us on Sunday mornings. The committee also will seek to better integrate our listening devices for the hearing impaired into the sound system in the Sanctuary.


Elizabeth Mye and Danielle Chamberlin will lead the effort and welcome the help of anyone who has expertise in this area.

**Annual Meeting** after worship Sunday, Feb. 13. **Come and enjoy** a soup lunch and then share in the work of the church.


