Meanwhile, CCB Council has been hard at work polishing our Local Church Profile, which has really come together with "one voice" from those who put work into it.

We are very proud of how the Summary Ministry Description has emerged, and we are happy to share it with you here as the culmination of a lot of hard work!

"The Congregational Church of Belmont seeks to create safe spaces for spiritual growth within our community. We pursue this mission through our key ministries — our youth, social action and music, by creating a Sunday worship experience open to all, and by optimizing the use of our biggest tangible asset, our historic building.

"To fulfill this mission, we need a leader who will help us shape what church means for 21st Century, post-pandemic, Silicon Valley — a community in need of spiritual safe havens, but full of folks who may or may not have been raised in a mainline Protestant tradition.

"We want to leverage our building to create connections to benefit our local community.

"Families are key to our church: We need a leader to help sustain our youth ministry and rebuild our children's program, which has tapered off during the pandemic. The ideal candidate will be willing to dig into the work of the church and pitch in as necessary.

"And we need a charismatic leader who will lead an engaging worship service that speaks to the needs of our community and is consistent with our progressive, Open and Affirming theology."


Real Good Church author to visit CCB on May 15

She will share her wisdom and the experience of her successful church revitalization with us as we continue to engage our own church growth process.




With her we

more important than the foundational work of welcoming young families and providing age-appropriate spiritual instruction for their children.



"Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them..." or ignore them, or turn them away.



Applying laws of physics to Easter egg dying

Is it possible to mix science and the mysterious beauty of the Easter celebration? It happened this past Easter during the activities with children and youth.

On April 16, several adults and teens met to dye eggs for the Easter Egg Hunt the next day, Easter Sunday. About seven dozen eggs were dunked in dye and decorated.

With many hands at work there were bound to be a few mishaps with dropped eggs; that was to be expected. What wasn't expected was one of the dropped eggs turned out to be raw!

By this time they were all colored. Which one of the beautifully colored eggs were raw? The raw eggs needed to be culled from rest of the colored eggs. The question of "How do you tell if an egg is raw or hardboiled" was Googled, and the participants started spinning eggs and learning a lesson in physics.

While the two eggs look and feel the same, there is a big difference in what's inside. When you spin the hard-boiled egg, the inside is solid and moves together; the egg will continue in a smooth spinning motion.

However, when you spin the raw egg, the fluid inside moves around and causes the egg to wobble. When slightly touched the raw egg will continue to spin for a few seconds more.

Touching stops the shell but the fluid inside the egg continues to move, which causes the egg to remain spinning.

The raw egg's resistance to stopping spinning is an example of inertia. Inertia is the tendency of an object to resist a change in motion. The inertia of the raw egg is greater than the inertia of the hard-boiled egg. The centrifugal force of the hard-boiled egg is greater than the raw egg because insides are solid and moving together resulting in a smooth spinning motion.

Eventually all eggs were dyed and creatively colored, and no one reported finding raw, gooey eggs during the Easter Egg Hunt.

Another opportunity to tie science and Easter together occurred during Sunday School. The children learned how the date of Easter is determined every year. Easter sometimes comes "late" and sometimes

"early." Why is that?

Easter comes the Sunday after the first full moon after the Vernal Equinox (the first day of Spring). This year March 20 was the first day of spring. The next full moon after the Vernal Equinox was April 16. The next Sunday AFTER the full moon of April 16 was April 17. Therefore, Easter occurred on April 17 this year.

After this brief lunar lesson (The

kids' eyes were glazing over!), the lesson continued with a discussion and art activity explaining these events of Holy Week — Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

Science and religion do not have to contradict or require proof of the validity of each other.

Each has a synchronicity and worthiness for our minds and souls.
