## Start cleaning closets for CCB's Yard Sale

Do you have piles of precious "stuff" you no longer use but can't quite part with?

Do you procrastinate hauling your cast-offs to Goodwill?

A solution awaits in the near future. Rummage Sale revisited is coming your way Aug. 27.

Rummage by any other name is still the same, but the new version of the rummage sale will be renamed the CCB Yard Sale. The entire operation will take place in front of the church on the driveway from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Yard Sale will be a scaled down version of past rummage sales. Individual families who wish to donate their goods to the sale will bring their items on the morning of the sale and set them out on tables provided by the church.

They will oversee their table(s), price the items, negotiate and take down their table and haul away anything that is left at the end of the day

What if you enjoy the excitement of a yard sale – the adrenalin rush of the crowds pouring in, seeing the pleasure on people's faces as they walk away satisfied with their bargains – but you don't want to manage a table? Volunteers are needed throughout the day as runners, crowd managers, parking attendants and cashiers.

In addition to the Yard Sale, there is the added bonus of making this a community event. Several nearby Congregational Churches, Catedral de Familia and CPNS will be invited to participate.

If shopping for bargains isn't a big enough draw, the Bouncy House, baked goods and music will be part of the fun.

The proceeds from the sales will go to CCB's Medical Debt Relief Project. (See the article on the project for more information.)

The date is Saturday, Aug. 27, from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. in front of the church.

Here's how it works:

- Go through your house and gather up all those items that no longer "give you joy."
- · Reserve a table at the sale by emailing Office@CCBelmont.org. (They're limited so hurry.)
- · Set up your table so you're ready to go when we open and staff it throughout the day.
- You will set the prices, haggle if necessary and conclude the sale by writing the total amount on a receipt.
- The buyer takes the receipt to the cashier, pays using cash, check, credit card or Venmo and brings the stamped receipt back to you to pick up their bagged items.
- At the end of the sale, you pack up your things that didn't sell and take them home with you (or to Goodwill).

Every cent raised will go toward erasing medical debt for people who have accumulated it through accident, misfortune and lack of medical insurance. Every \$1 raised off-sets \$100 in medical debt as we work with the organization RIP Medical Debt. Through the national office of the United Church of Christ, millions of dollars in medical debt has already been retired. Ask us and we can show you a video on how it works!

Did we mention we'll have a Bouncy House,

## Turns out, solar panels won't work for CCB

The solar project team has been busy investigating the options for rooftop solar power at CCB.

At February's Annual Meeting, solar power was chosen as one of the top five goals for the church, and a team was assembled with Mike Venturino, Micki Carter, Linda Howard, Keith Howard, Danielle Chamberlin, Elizabeth Nordt, Leslie Marx and me.

The team met with Bill Hilton of Unitarian Universalist Church of Palo Alto to discuss his church's experience installing solar panels, and we also spoke with many solar companies and consultants.

From the information we received, unfortunately, it appears that rooftop solar at CCB isn't feasible for now.

The church's status as a non-profit entity makes the economics of solar power more difficult. When homeowners install solar panels on their roofs, they receive a federal tax credit which effectively lowers the cost



by 26 percent. CCB can't benefit from this tax break for residential solar, and would be considered a commercial solar project, requiring a more complex financing arrangement.

The church would need to lease the solar panels from a finance company or sign a long-term power purchase agreement at a pre-negotiated rate per kilowatt-hour, rather than buy the solar panels outright. There aren't many solar financing companies that can do this, and they don't like to deal with projects as small as ours would be.

A second difficulty is the church roof. Although it looks like traditional wood shingle, it's actually a metal architectural shingle with a 50-year lifetime. It was installed in 1998 and still has decades of life left in it. Standard methods of solar panel installation aren't possible on this type of roof.

Most of the solar companies declined to even consider it, while one said it might be possible if we replaced the roof sections under the panels with asphalt single. It wouldn't be sensible for the church to pay extra money to downgrade to a lesser-quality roof material.

The size and orientation of the roof are also problematic. It's not well-situated for collecting sunlight, and there's not enough roof area to fit all the solar panels that would be needed to offset the church's normal electric use.

We contacted ten different solar companies and also spoke with a solar consultant who is an old friend of Danielle and me.

In the end, due to the financial and site difficulties, we failed to get any specific bids.

Even though this wasn't the result we'd hoped for, the work was helpful for learning about solar possibilities and bringing closure to something we've talked about for a long time but had never taken further until now.

The team is considering other energysaving and green options. The ideas include heat pumps, solar hot water, rain barrels, and a gray-water system to irrigate the lawn.

# Help CCB erase \$100 in medical debt for every \$1 raised. Our goal is \$5,000!

CCB has launched its Medical Debt Relief Project with an initial gift of \$500 from friends and family of Barbara Todd at her memorial May 21.

Every dollar raised eliminates \$100 in medical debt through the auspices of debt consolidator RIP Medical Debt, which has eliminated millions of debt through projects funded by churches of the United Church of Christ.

Our goal is to raise \$5,000 and erase \$500,000 for those who are carrying a burden they cannot lift.

The Yard Sale described on Page 4 will be our first all-church fundraiser for the Medical Debt Relief Project of CCB.

Here's how RIP describes their work:

"Every day, we receive messages from people who suffer under crushing debt far beyond their financial means to pay from the son of a stroke survivor in Kentucky whose family could not keep up with their mortgage payments, to the cancer patient in Florida whose debts made it impossible for her to continue with necessary treatment. Rising health care costs and endless bills are leaving families with nowhere to turn.

"RIP uses donors' funds to wipe out medical debt from the neediest cases up.

"Once we've pinpointed the portfolios for those in or near the poverty level, we buy up their debt. Then we send notices to the benefiting families, and subsequently help the recipients repair their credit reports renewing their access to opportunities and resources that will allow them to rebuild and recover."

This <u>video</u> from NBC News tells the story.

We are looking for families and friends who will match the proceeds of the Yard Sale or half the proceeds or 10 percent of the proceeds. If we can do that, we'll make it to our goal of \$5,000 in no time.
