On the visioning front, we have submitted our Local Church Profile and job description for a full-time pastor to the NCNC and it has been posted on the national UCC site. We have already received our first two pastoral profiles for consideration. The search committee will be meeting with Rev. Davena Jones on Friday July 30 to kick off our search process.

In addition to discussions with First Church Redwood City, I also had an initial conversation with Jim Garrison of College Heights UCC. They are also beginning their visioning process for a settled pastor and reached out to see if it would make sense to share pastoral resources with us, an intriguing offer. Jim Garrison and I agreed to get our search committees together to further explore this idea in coming months. Building on our shared Maundy Thursday service earlier this year, we're continuing to reach out to the other local UCCs in our area. We love finding ways we can be stronger together, and believe it will further grow the energy of all our congregations.

## Afghan refugees welcomed at Notre Dame

Three Afghan families who were evacuated from Kabul in that chaotic scene a year ago are now living in student housing at Notre Dame de Namur University just down the hill from CCB.

I used my connections at NDNU (where I used to teach) to find out if we could help these families — and the others who are expected to join them — in settling into life on the Peninsula. I spoke with Elgiva Wood of the International Rescue Committee and learned that she is seeking "resettlement teams" of six to eight people who would sign a contract for a six-month commitment to help one family navigate life here.

The teams would assist in the following wavs:

- Finding housing on the Peninsula (not necessarily in Belmont)
- Working through the logistics of getting Social Security cards and



registering for benefits

- Looking for work
- Socializing and helping them adjust to life in the US
- Practicing English language skills
- Enrolling children in school
- Acclimatizing in general

Some members of the family have some basic English skills although they speak Pashto, but Wood said language is not usually a barrier that can't be overcome.

The IRC is also asking for a monetary pledge of \$2,500-\$5,000 for each family to supplement the resettlement grant they receive from the federal government.

Hope you're scouring your closets and garages for the very best items you're ready to part with. CCB's Yard Sale is coming from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 27, and it's a fundraiser for CCB's Medical Debt Relief Fund.

The front lawn of the church will be transformed with tables along both sides of the driveway to showcase the classy castoffs of CCB and some of our friends. We will organize all the offerings from CCBers so that we have all the appliances, kitchenware, electronics, toys, small furniture items and clothing (only the very gently used) can be displayed together. Everything will be priced, and CCB members will take turns staffing the tables.

What else? The bouncy house will be in one corner of the lawn, and a bake sale will offer goodies to eat or take home. We'll have Square set up so we can take cash, checks or credit cards for purchases and donations.

Every cent raised will go toward alleviating medical debt through CCB's Medical Debt Relief Fund. Every dollar will offset \$100 in medical debt through the auspices of RIP Medical Debt, a debt consolidator. Our goal is to raise \$5,000 to erase \$500,000 in medical debt, and we're looking for donors who will match (all or a portion of) what we raise at the Yard Sale.

Linda Howard is chairing the event, and she needs to hear from you with the hours you can work the sale or manage the bouncy house or be a cashier. Plan to bring your items early enough to get everything set up and priced and be ready for our first customers at 9 a.m. Chances are good that we can get PARCA to pick up our leftovers on Monday, but they won't take furniture. So if you bring large items and they don't sell, plan to take them back home with you. If you need to bring some things ahead of time, we do have a limited amount of space to store items at the church.

The Prayer in the Four Direc-


