# Wendy Taylor is honored as CCB's Pastor Emerita

The Rev. Wendy Taylor, who served as co-pastor and pastor of the Congregational Church of Belmont from 1988-1999, was honored with the title Pastor Emerita during worship on May 18.

As part of the service, Pastor Jim invited Micki Carter and Mike Venturino (who were married by Wendy in 1996) to reminisce. Here's what Micki said:

"This small church has had a significant role in the path to ordination for gay men and women.

"In 1972, Bob Shouse cast a YES vote at the San Carlos United Church of Christ for the ordination of Bill Johnson, the first gay man to be called to the priesthood by a mainline denomination.

"But more than 15 years later, an openly gay woman still had not been ordained by the UCC or any other mainline denomination. Wendy Taylor, a Pacific School of Religion graduate who was seeking ordination but needed a call, had a counseling office downstairs at the Congregational Church of Belmont.

"It was the CCB pastor at the time, the

Rev. John Brooke, who would become the real hero in Wendy's story. He knew Wendy and he also knew that she had not been successful in finding a call to pastor a congregation. He was convinced that any congregation would love her if they could get to know her well — before she was a candidate for a call.

"In 1987, John was due for a sabbatical, and he suggested that Wendy could fill in nicely since she was already present in the church. Of course, he was right. We loved Wendy, and we really loved her partner Ellen, a former nun who introduced us to an entire repertoire of Jesuit folk songs.

"Then, a few months after he returned from his sabbatical, John announced that he wanted to work only half time in preparation for retirement and proposed sharing the pastorate equally with Wendy. He even took a pay cut so that he and Wendy would be paid the same as co-pastors.

"When the congregation agreed, Wendy had her call. We ordained Wendy right here in this Sanctuary and then we hosted a commitment service for Wendy and Ellen."

We are an Open and Affirming Congregation valuing everyone's race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, age, class, physical and mental abilities.

### Warren's Wonderings



## Always bloom where you are planted

I always find traveling interesting. These last weeks I have been traveling the trail of Anne Frank, Vicktor Frankl and other heroes of World War II.

On May 26 we celebrated Memorial Day, honoring those who have given their lives for the hope of Freedom. When I served a church in Vallejo, I was acquainted with people from the Philippines who had immigrated, joined the military in order to serve, and became citizens.

As I relive this journey of the past couple of weeks, I am reminded of the words of Tim Hansel, "Bloom where you are planted." For me, traveling on a study tour invites me to note the impact I have on others and the impact they have on me.

One of my fellow travelers was from Canada. (And no, they like being Canadians.) She served as supervisor of schooling in the prison system. She talked of how grateful she was to help people gain an education, begin to believe a new future was possible, and then to never see them again (a sign of the incarcerated student's progress).

It helps me think of how our church has been a Project Change scholarship sponsor for the College of San Mateo's education and support program for incarcerated youth here in San Mateo County. The scholarship is, of course, in honor of our beloved Rev. Kristi Denham. We are honored in this church to have people who have been teachers, mentors and prayer partners of those incarcerated.

Another fellow traveler was a woman who had a job for state government supporting nonprofits. On the second day she was pushed off of her bike into an irrigation ditch. As she stepped off the bike to avoid a large delivery truck, she rolled her ankle and fell completely under water. A local village man responded by calling emergency services.

They drove several miles to the village, assessed her injury, wrapped her ankle and called for a taxi to drive her to our barge of residence.

All this was done while the local man's wife brought tea for the injured person. And the cost? NO COST for emergency service. "That is what we provide here."

Afterward I checked in with her regarding the trauma of the submerging experience.

Another traveler was an attorney. When he found out I was a part of the Peninsula Conflict Resolution Center, he talked about how his friend invites him each year to sponsor a table to support their San Diego Area Conflict Resolution Center. I discussed

with him just how meaningful those signs of support are to the organization... just like our support of the scholarship with Project Change.

On the journey we often stopped at memorial plaques for downed World War II Allied planes trying to free the Netherlands and Belgium. One place we stopped was a whole cemetery that held the dead of a full company of Canadian military personnel.

Our Canadian travelers shared their memories of their grief. As I supported them in their tears, I thought of our Paul Michel and his father who was a resistance fighter in France.

Another person I met on the journey, was a young person technically from Utah. She asked me what I did/do. It gave me a chance to share my story. But as Georgi likes to do, it gives us a chance to ask the reciprocal question, "And how do you spend your time?"

She responded by telling me that she is in the Peace Corp serving in Africa. How honored I was to hear of her stories, to share in her work with trauma... and the sharing of my manual for healing.

I am reminded over and over again, "Bloom where you are planted."




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### Celebrating the centennial of our building!

## CCP Sanctuary Redesign group examines options

The CCP Sanctuary Redesign Committee recently concluded two introductory meetings with architect Naomi Miroglio of Architectural Resources Group.

Naomi was recommended to Pastor Jim by the Congregational Church of San Mateo, based on a successful collaboration on a similar project several years ago.

These initial conversations provided a valuable opportunity to share hopes and ideas and to explore how we might build consensus across a range of perspectives.

Drawing on her extensive experience working with churches, Naomi emphasized the importance of aligning our redesign vision with the guiding principles, core philosophies and long-term goals of our congregation.

Naomi also shared that current construction costs are averaging approximately \$750 per square foot, reflecting the realities of today's building market.

With our sanctuary measuring around 2,300 square feet, the estimated construction cost would be approximately \$1.75 million - excluding furnishings, fixtures and other

related expenses.

With this preliminary information in hand, the committee now faces a pivotal decision: Should CCP move forward with a full sanctuary renovation, or are there alternative approaches that might better align with our congregation's vision and available resources?

To begin addressing these questions, the committee will hold a follow-up meeting in the coming months.

This gathering will be a key opportunity to evaluate our options, consider financial implications, and begin shaping a path forward that reflects the values and aspirations of the CCP community.

We encourage all members to stay engaged and informed as this process unfolds. Your input and support will be essential as we discern the best way to steward our sacred space for the future.

## Sustainable SMC honored with grant

Through information and advocacy, the nonprofit Sustainable San Mateo County stimulates action on environmental, economic and social equity issues in order to improve the lives of people who live and work in our County.

In 2024, SSMC received a grant from CCP's Social Action Board. The \$5,000 grant supported high school and college interns working during the summer on the organization's Sustainability Ideas Bank.

Ideas from government and businesses are researched, vetted, documented and placed in a database by a team of 10 to 12 students every summer. Cities, businesses, and agencies have access to hundreds of creative ideas and who to contact for more information. The grant provided stipends, supplies, and materials for the students.

This year the board, learning of other programs offered by SSMC, voted to provide a \$2,500 capacity grant to the nonprofit.

Other key SSMC programs are:

#### Sustainability Awards

For 26 years, SSMC has honored "sustainability champions" at this event. Honorees represent businesses, agencies, nonprofits and individuals who have made an impact with their commitments to sustainability.

This year a new category honoring Youth was added. SSMC partners with the American Institute of Architects to present one or more "Green Building" awards.

### **Sustainability Dashboard**

The Dashboard measures the performance of San Mateo County cities across 12 categories, including housing, energy, food,

climate adaptation and sea-level rise. The report provides valuable data on how cities are performing on matters of concern to their constituents and draws a picture of how they compare with other county cities. SSMC staff frequently meet with city officials to assist them in improving their sustainability performance.

### **Indicators Report**

This report looks at one crucial sustainability issue each year, examining its history, impact and future implications for San Mateo County. Among recent topics have been climate change, well-being of children and families, housing and equitable paths to EV charging.

### **Donation to ALAS benefits Coastside**

Veronica Rodriguez, director of development from Ayudando Latino a Sonar (ALAS), spoke to the Congregational Church of the Peninsula on April 6, explaining the work of this non-profit located in Half Moon Bay.

Operating since 2011, ALAS combines a multitude of social services along with promoting cultural identity through music and art.

ALAS realized the importance of supporting a community of individuals who are connected by a common cultural heritage. In the beginning, ALAS brought the first cultural arts program to the farm workers and their families in Half Moon Bay with a program known as Ballet Folklorico and Mariachi.

Pride grew in their common cultural heritage of music and dance. At the same time this grassroots organization recognized that more work needed to be done to improve the local people's lives.

ALAS serves a dual focus on immediate needs and long-term transformation. In

order for adults of all ages and children to not only grow but to thrive, basic needs must be met. ALAS supports the Coastal community in the following ways: The Equity Express Bus, Social Services, Cultural Arts, Education, Immigration, Crisis Support and Research.

The Equity Bus: If you drive through Half Moon Bay, you might see a large bus decorated with flowers and other colorful motifs. The Equity Bus, as it is known, is a mobile resource center offering tutoring, mental health services, telehealth advice, and facilitation of online adult classes in partnership with local community colleges.

**Social Services:** This part of the program strives to help the community cope with challenges they face day-to-day. Case management is part of the services provided. Food insecurity can be a problem, so every second and fourth Fridays, ALAS organizes a food distribution center

**Cultural Arts:** The programs of music and art is at the heart of ALAS's belief that coming together to celebrate the culture of the people is a powerful tool for collective

healing and engagement. The youth and families continue to hold their institutional memory by advancing the arts of Ballet Folklorico, and music.

**Education:** Students from Notre Dame de Namur University, University of San Francisco and Canada College provide tutoring and mentorship to the youth. ALAS believes that this program creates a pipeline to continuing education by connecting the youth to institutions of higher learning.

Finally, a unique aspect of ALAS is the partnerships with Stanford University, the University of San Francisco and UC Irvine. Together with input from ALAS staff and community members, the universities study and collect data about the effects of health disparities, systematic injustices, and strengths rooted in cultural identity within marginalized communities, particularly those impacted my immigration

The Social Action Board recently donated \$2,500 to ALAS from the Lyman Covenant fund to support this vision and takes pride in supporting the organization's continued good work.
